<p><i>Story</i></p> <p>'Superworm' - Julia Donaldson</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Listen to the story 'Superworm' by Julia Donaldson https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DSaDFVkkPOw Talk about the story with your child... What was their favourite part? Why? Find some sets of rhyming words. <p><i>Optional:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Make an extra page for the book where Superworm helps a different animal. Design a superhero costume for Superworm to wear.
<p><i>Tricky words</i></p> <p>Tricky words: the, to and do</p> <p>Focus - sight words: is, on, at</p> <p>Please feel free to continue spending 5 minutes a day revising the sounds. Refer to the 'Supporting Phonics at Home' document for ideas and activities. http://www.firhouseetns.ie/junior-infants.html</p>	<p>We are revising some tricky words. We have put together ideas and resources for practising Tricky Words called 'Supporting Word Work at Home'. http://www.firhouseetns.ie/junior-infants.html</p> <p>Sight words can be sounded out but the children begin to recognise them and read them by sight as they come across them frequently.</p> <p>Daily practice</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Teach tricky words by sounding them out and learning the correct pronunciation e.g. my. If we sound out 'they' phonetically, we would say 'tuh-huh-eh-yuh'. Explain that 'they' is actually a tricky word, we can't sound it out normally. It actually says 'thuh-aye'. Practise the tricky words until they can be read automatically. See if your child can spot some tricky words when you are reading stories together. <p>Tricky word worksheet</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Children will be using the "Look, Cover, Write and Check" method. This is a great method to become familiar with as they will use this throughout primary school for their spellings. When the children are spelling the tricky words aloud, encourage them to use the <u>letter names</u>, not the sound. E.g. 'they' is spelled 't-h-e-y' not 'tuh-huh-eh-yuh'. Children can also write a sentence using each tricky word.

<p>Other reader options also related to minibeasts: <i>Pink A</i> <i>In The Garden</i> <i>Minibeasts</i> (non fiction).</p>	<p>you're having difficulty accessing the book.</p> <p>When Reading:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Begin by looking at the title of the book. Make a prediction - what will this book be about? You can read the title of the book to the child. • Talk about the sounds they hear - what does 'ladybird' start with? What does 'flower' end with? • Go through each page of the book slowly at first. Guide your child to put their finger under the words as they read. • Point out tricky words if the child doesn't notice them at first. • Use strategies as well as sounding out words: Looking at the picture, checking the first sound of the word. Could you figure it out using the first sound and the picture as clues? • Continue through the book using a combination of these strategies. • Congratulate your child at the end - make a big deal! They are becoming an independent reader. • This book should be read three times this week. It is okay if your child seems to know it by heart after the third time - they will recognise some words and use their strategies with confidence. Encourage them to put their finger under each word as they read it, as they may try to rush through. <p>Worksheet</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We have put the activity from this book at the end of this document. • It is good to respond to the book after reading it the second or third time, whether that is through conversation, a picture or the worksheet below.

Maths

Number 8

- Make some sets of 8
- Find some sets of 8 around your home.
- When you have found a set of 8 in your home and outside, try and figure out some of the different ways you can make eight.
- Can you show the number story of 8? You could count the number of plates in your cupboard? Can you count eight pairs of shoes? Can you count eight storybooks you own? Can you count eight spots on a ladybird? Can you find 3 worms and 5 bees, and add them to make 8?
- Practise writing the number 8: do this in pencil, crayon, paint, make a rainbow 8, do some sensory writing: in rice, shaving foam, flour, make out of playdough.
- Use the number formation rhyme: *Make an 's' and do not wait, when it's joined up you have an eight.*

Weight


This week we will revise the concept of weight. In Junior Infants, we focus on **heavy** and **light**. You and your child can practise comparing two household items in terms of weight, taking a guess at which is heavier and which is lighter.

Simple weight practise at home:

- Make a balance scale at home using a hanger, string and two paper/plastic cups of the same size. See picture below to demonstrate how to make the balance scales.



- First gather up to 5 objects of varying weight. E.g. fork, bottle, teddy bear, a pair of socks, banana etc. The sizes should be small enough to fit inside the balance scale.
- Compare two items at a time and predict which item will be **heavier**.
- Allow time to give a reason to why they think an item would be heavier than the other.
- Place an item in the balance scale one at a time and see what happens.
- The item that is lower to the ground is heavier.
- With each item, predict which item is heavier and then test.
- Children can draw pictures or write the names of the items to record the answer of each test on a table similar to below.
